#### **Background**

During the time of the economic crisis, the issue of patient payments - defined as direct payments of the population for health care services - is occupying more and more policy discussion worldwide.

The types of patient payments are rather diverse (starting from official co-payments for health care services to informal payments of the population), and raise several challenging and relevant questions in health policy, which should be the topic of recent and further research such as:

Who are already paying for health care services, how much, in what form, and how these spending are distributed among different social-economic groups;

Who should pay, who are willing to pay, who are able to pay for health care services and how much;

What is the connection between formal and informal payments – are they substitute or complementary;

What is the attitude of the population towards patient payments, and how to implement patient payments policies acceptable for the public;

Whether patient payments are efficient tool to control public spending on health;

What do we know about their effect on efficiency, equity and quality of the health care system?

The conference is the part of a collaborative research project ASSPRO CEE 2007 (Full title: Assessment of patient payment policies and projection of their efficiency, equity and quality effects: The case of Central and Eastern Europe) co-funded by the European Commission under the Socio-economic Sciences and Humanities (GA no. 217431).

Involved Project Partners are: Maastricht University, The Netherlands; Health Economics and Health Technology Assessment Research Centre, Hungary; Medical University of Varna, Bulgaria; Public Enterprise "MTVC" (training, research and development centre), Lithuania; Uniwersytet Jagiellonski Collegium Medicum, Poland; Scoala Nationala de Sanatate Publica, Romania; School of Public Health, Ukraine.

So far, in the first round of the research focus group discussions with health care consumers and providers, and in-depth interviews with health policy makers and health insurance representatives were carried out on the attitude towards patient payments in the six partner countries during the summer of 2009. After, quantitative data were collected on the past use/payments and willingness to pay of the population for health care services with the sample size of 1000 respondents per country. During the conference project partners will present new results from the household survey.
